Themes: Seasons, Life Cycle, Friendship


Grade Level: K to 1st grade

# **TIME TO READ!**

**Before reading:** Begin by discussing the title. Ask, "What does it mean to be from the city? How about the country?" Where are most of the children from? Show a few pages from the story and talk about how we can tell what *season* it is based on the illustrations.

### **RELATED ACTIVITIES**

#### **FUNNY FROG FACES (AGES 5-7)**

Ingredients: English muffin halves, cream cheese, green food coloring, banana slices, raisins, fruit leather


Give each child a muffin half. Add a few drops of food coloring to the cream cheese; spread cheese on muffin. Place two banana slices toward the top of the muffin. Put a raisin in the middle of each slice to make eyes. Use part of a fruit leather to make the frog's long, sticky tongue. Enjoy!

#### **SEASONAL SORTING (AGES 5-7)**

Hold a seasonal sort using different season-specific items (such as a bathing suit, hat, sunglasses, coat, pumpkin, flowers, etc.). Mark off four different areas of the room and label them by season. Ask students to take turns picking an item and grouping it with the right season. Have them explain their decision. Can some items be used in more than one season? Discuss!

#### FRIENDSHIP FROGS (AGES 5-7)

Materials: rocks, green paint, brushes, glue, wiggle eyes, black marker
