# TIME TO READ!

Before reading, build background: What does your child know about slavery and the American Civil War? This is the true story of a slave named Dave

who lived during that time period.

While reading, make inferences: Where did Dave learn to read and write? What can you guess about his life based on what the author tells you?

# **RELATED ACTIVITIES**

#### After reading, ask questions:

- Do you think Dave knows what he is going to create before he starts?
- How can a pot hold memories?
- Do you think it's harder to paint a picture or sculpt a pot?



#### **CLAY CREATION**

Ingredients: 2 cups salt, 2/3 cup water, 1 cup cornstarch, 1/2 cup cold water

Mix 2/3 cup water and salt in saucepan over medium heat. Stir about 5 minutes until salt is dissolved. Remove from heat. Add cornstarch and remaining water. Stir until smooth. Return saucepan to medium heat and cook mixture until thick, stirring occasionally. Once mixture has thickened, remove from heat and let cool. Use your "clay" to create your own piece of pottery! You can use a toothpick to write on your piece of art.

## A "COUPLET" OF POEMS

Dave often expressed himself with couplets. A couplet is two lines of poetry, one after the other, that rhyme. Here's one Dave wrote on April 8, 1858: "This noble jar
